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What is an Electronic Health Record (EHR)?

- An electronic version of a patient's medical history
- Helps to ensure:
 - medical history and current medications are easily accessible to authorized providers;
 - supports coordination and continuation of care across environments.



Why invest in EHR?

Equitable, person-focused A seamless experience care

- Faster access to care and resources in times of crisis.
- Better service in communities with historic barriers to care.
- Data to improve health outcomes and address inequities.

- Coordinate care across providers, programs, services, and communities.
- Increase efficiency and fewer redundancies.
- Help people connect and keep services with easy-to-use systems.



Why invest in EHR? (cont.)

Challenges to receiving needed healthcare:

- **Finding** primary care and behavioral health providers.
- If found, providers often cannot readily access previous healthcare records.
- These providers often do not have adequate tools to make in-the-moment referrals and depend on phone and fax.
- In a crisis, these limitations only make things worse.



Optimizing outcomes

Focusing on underserved, vulnerable populations

- Behavioral Health, Tribal, Long-Term Care, and Rural
- Supporting standard infrastructure
 - Of the 7.7 million Washington residents, 5.5 million resident records exist within a common EHR product
- Facilitating care coordination through authorized sharing
- Enabling client access to mobile tools to manage care



Benefits of a statewide EHR

 - Maximizing federal match
