

About Washington Apple Health (Medicaid)

In Washington State, we call the Medicaid program "Apple Health." Apple Health provides health care coverage to nearly 2 million residents—adults and children. Washington's uninsured rate has dropped to an historic 5.4 percent, thanks in part to access to Apple Health made possible through the Affordable Care Act.

Covered services

Those enrolled in Apple Health have access to many health care services, including:

- Office visits with a doctor or health care professional
- Emergency medical care
- Maternity and newborn care
- Mental health services
- Treatment for chemical or alcohol dependence
- Pediatric services, including well-child visits, immunizations, dental and vision care

- Limited dental and vision care for adults
- Hospitalization
- Prescription medications
- Laboratory services
- Transportation to and from medical appointments, when necessary
- An interpreter for appointments, when necessary

Applying for coverage


Individuals apply for Apple Health coverage through our state's health benefit exchange, Washington Healthplanfinder. Even if they are not eligible for Apple Health, visitors can then explore low-cost private insurance options on Washington Healthplanfinder.
