It was resolved quickly with no report of disruption in service. The BHAs have been working hard to connect with the community. OBHA presented at the COD conference and is preparing to present at the BH conference in June. Our David Rodriguez, BHA in Southwest, was featured on the SW NAMI Newsletter. We were able to hire an Advocacy Coordinator for the OBHA. He has been making many connections with providers in King County</li> <li>Richelle Madigan- Updates on family and work she is doing regarding her son and the CLIP program: the discharge planning collaboration that led to a specialized community based residential model for meeting the need of complex IDD/MH co-occurring cases. DVR is in Order of Selection, which is when DVR does not have adequate financial resources or staff capacity to serve all eligible individuals, it must establish a waiting list for services. Waiting list rules are established by the federal Rehabilitation Services Administration. These rules require that DVR serve</li> </ul>
