				sheet would be helpful if/once it is available. Michael indicated he would take the concerns back to DBHR leadership. What does the next Leg session look like? The next "short" session will involve cleanup more than new legislation. Efforts will largely be focused on resolving outstanding issues (PDMP, residences, ITA ambulance and court costs, ramp up for PACT, MH waivers for IMD, match dollars for PATH, and Tribal E&T). For the Sunrise Review on changes in licensure for peer counsellors, it acts as a feasibility study on what possibly could change. Members relayed anxiety from field providers, that there was a limited level of education in the community around the implementation changes and that there's not a centralized source for updates, but that organizations try to fill that gap. Highlighted the work of all involved in the submission of the Block Grant application and answered questions on the limited timeframe for providing feedback on the full application, noting that as a perennial problem between the states and SAMHSA. Members mentioned the desire for oversight of funding of projects and priorities around the application and implementation of the block grant. Michael responded with an ask for clarification on the level of granularity needed.

Introduced some personal advocacy regarding the limits around in-patient treatment for kids in crisis and asked for a boost in advocating for increasing the amount of long-term services available in WA. Peer Spokane is opening up next week, all are invited. Peer specialist forums and outreach to the LGBTQ community, highlighted syringe exchange program in Pend Orielle county, emphasizing what a big deal that is in such a conservative area.
