Rate Increase recommendation

- Seeking a general Medicaid rate increase to be applicable to all Behavioral Health (BH) providers and services.
- Working with the BH Council on the recommendation to determine the percentages, amount, and framework, including directive payment language.
- When BH council comes up with rate and framework, we need to recommend it to be applied to all.

Children's Long-term Inpatient Program (CLIP) Ask/Decision Package (DP)

- Asking for a 15-20% rate increase for the CLIP program with the intent of aligning with DP packages.
- Possible DP for the CLIP program with a 15% rate increase to expand the traditional CLIP facilities and to expand Habilitative Mental Health (HMH), which is specific to youth with complex disorders.
- HMH is currently funded for 12 beds: asking for up to 20 beds.

Short-term Residential

- Residential crisis stabilization program does not have a DP to increase the rate.
 - What scale needed to stand up services?
 - Daily rate is projected for 818.71. I have not heard any feedback on the daily rate.
 - Building on rate projections from last year.
 - Need reimbursement adjustment(s) with new short-term crisis stabilization facilities

Support Items:

Barriers

Place holder for Supervision – Info on compact and other barriers.

- Compact bill is #1 priority to address the amount of credit hours and licensure language (Sara Stewart bring back more details next meeting)
- Address out of state services if services
- Change hours to get licensed to get more staff

Place holder for Administrative -

- Hire FTE to do prep for audits. Audits have become inefficient. (Example: 14 audits in 16 months with one corrective action).
- Reducing the number of MCO's that we need to work with, or finding a better way to share audit information would reduce the administrative burden (Mary Stone-Smith to bring back information)
- Credentialing individuals from other countries

Loan Repayment and conditional grants.

- Grants are through Ballmer group and apply currently to Master Social Work (MSW) in marriage and family; other behavioral health-oriented degrees are not eligible for the Ballmer grant.
- Important to look at other professional degrees, licensure positions and other BH staff that may be eligible or should be included in the grant program.

• Dollar amounts are TBD; ask is around the setting a person can work into be eligible for scholarships/grants/loan repayments. Next is the degree level eligible for payments.
