

## Charge of the workgroup

- Identify current alignment of measures and gaps within the WSCMS to rural health priorities
- Review measures for potential addition to the WSCMS
- Explore opportunities to consistently apply a rural lens during the measure review process
- Consider how the PMCC can work more closely with rural health communities and tap into their expertise
- Identify opportunities to promote rural health priorities through the WSCMS
- Develop and present recommendations for the PMCC to consider

## Review process for workgroup



## **Overview of Meeting 1**

- Step 1: Identify what is currently being used in rural communities
- Key discussion points:
  - Measures that are currently required for reporting and who they report to
    - > There are numerous measures reportable through multiple programs
  - Barriers to reporting
    - Measures and the reporting activities are not consistent between communities
    - More difficult to collect clinical measures than hospital measures due to different systems and organizational size
    - > They are all doing it a bit differently and use different methodologies, which makes comparison difficult
    - > If they want to add a non-required measure, they must develop it themselves
    - > Lack of trust of the data for measures that are not based on national standards
    - > Duplicative reporting across multiple programs
  - ► It would be helpful to identify those measures that are more meaningful
  - ► When considering priority measures, the measures that are currently required may be the best to use

### Timeframe of activities

- Three workgroup meetings scheduled through early March
- Recommendations to Performance Measurement Committee Spring meeting (May 7, 2025, 9:00 – 11:00 am.)
- Workgroup makes refinements to recommendations based on PMCC feedback (if needed)
- Public comment period in November, (may be earlier) if recommending the addition of new measures
- PMCC finalizes recommendations in December
- Changes to 2026 WSCMS finalized by HCA by December 31, 2025

## Biennial Review of the WA State Common Measure Set

#### Overview

#### **2**014:

- Legislation ESHB 2572 required a common way to measure quality across Washington
- Performance Measures Coordinating Committee established the first Washington State Common Measure Set
- The Washington State Common Measure Set
  - ► Informs what measures go into state purchasing contracts
  - ► Informs measures that are selected for value-based purchasing
  - ► Reflects the needs of the population of Washington
  - Reflects the priorities of HCA and other partners
  - ► Aligns, where possible, with national reporting requirements

#### Role of the PMCC

#### PMCC is responsible for:

- Setting overall direction for Common Measure Set, including:
  - Scope of measurement
  - Measure selection process
- Ensure a transparent process and opportunity for public comment
- Review and recommend final measure set to HCA (HCA has final approval)
- Oversee ongoing process to evaluate and modify Common Measure Set over time

## **Our Charge**

- Use PMCC defined set of criteria to review current list of measures
  - Consider what is most important
- Review the current measures in the Washington State Common Measure Set (WSCMS)
- Identify potential measures for removal in WSCMS
- Identify priority measures from existing WSCMS that may be considered for core set
- Present final recommendations to the PMCC at the fall meeting

## Proposed process for 2025 review

- Conduct review together, as a committee, rather than convene an ad hoc committee to bring recommendations to the PMCC
- Consider a smaller "core set" of priority measures
- Include subsets of additional measures, not in core set
  - Rural health, Diabetes, Pediatric, etc.
- Engage SMEs for review of certain sections
- Consider if current categories still make sense
  - VBP Arrangements in Contracts, Statewide Population Health Monitoring, Monitoring Hospital Quality
- Consider if the current Measure Selection Criteria should be updated

### **Questions for PMCC Members**

- How do you want to break down the WSCMS for review?
  - ► By domain or topic area; or
  - ► Go down the list and review 15-20 measures at a time
- Consideration for identifying core set measures
  - ▶ Does the PMCC want to select a goal for number of measures; or
  - Review recommendations for core set first and then determine size
- Other considerations
  - Should the core set include only "VBP appropriate" measures or others?
  - What is currently used vs not at all
    - High/intermediate/low priorities
  - Mixture of PCP and other specialty measures
  - Broad range of disease states
  - Strongly promote activities within WA

## Questions for PMCC Members, cont.

- Should we only prioritize HEDIS measures, or does it make sense to include multiple versions of similar measures? For example:
  - Screening for Depression and Follow-Up
    - > Providers typically use CMS measures in their federal programs
  - Depression Screening and Follow-Up (DSF-E)
    - > Health Plans use NCQA HEDIS measures for accreditation requirements
- Are there other opportunities/strategies to consider?

- The PMCC will receive measure criteria and the measures review list beginning in March
