Not just people who are without insurance or ineligible for intensive treatments like Children's Long-term Inpatient Program (CLIP) • CLIP program access and robust discharge plans for young people • Behavioral Health (BH) professionals in schools • BH integration • Wraparound with Intensive Services (WISe) for families and youth without Medicaid • Access and knowledge of peer services • Use of diagnostic tools to treat the whole person (e.g., psychological testing and neuro psychological testing) The above priorities are in addition to continued work on the exploration of a respite waiver that was identified as a priority in the 2021 legislative session. At the May YYACC meeting, presentations were provided on the expansion of youth mobile crisis services, an update on the exploration of waiver options for respite, and recovery support services peer support programs. The work of the CRIS is connected to a broader effort happening across Washington related to crisis response and services. In 2021, the Washington State Legislature passed House Bill 1477, establishing the Crisis Response Improvement Strategy (CRIS) Committee and Steering Committee. These committees will develop recommendations to support implementation of the national 988 suicide prevention hotline and the statewide improvement of behavioral health crisis response and suicide	For questions, contact HCAprogram1477 @hca.wa.gov	Those interested	anytime
	prevention services. This was in response to federal legislation from July 2020 to add 988 as an option to contact the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline hotline. 988 is set to begin July 16, 2022 and is intended to make it easier for people in crisis to access help, having a 3 digit number to remember instead of a 10 digit number. The Crisis Call Center Hub Act or Engrossed 2 nd Substitute House Bill 1477 (E2SHB 1477) is intended to implement 988 in Washington and improve access to crisis services. The work to implement HB 1477 follows the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) best practice toolkit for crisis services. Key points of the legislation included funds for 988 implementation, establishing the Crisis Response Improvement Strategy (CRIS) committee to bring consultation and lived experience to the implementation of the Act, create crisis call center hubs to dispatch mobile crisis teams, create a technology platform to improve

Next Statewide FYSPRT Meeting Thursday, July 28, 2022		included distinct directives for equity in development, delivery and access of crisis services. The goal is creating a system with someone to talk to, someone to respond and somewhere to go, reducing the use of police or first responders in crisis calls and integrating peers into crisis work. In addition, Washington is establishing standards for mobile crisis teams, expanding youth crisis services to meet the developmental needs of youth, young adults, and families, deescalating a crisis (as defined by youth and parents/caregivers), keeping young people in their homes and communities when possible, and connecting youth and families to natural, community and clinical supports and ensuring those services responses to the needs and unique cultures in the state. Having a place to go, if needed, is also a focus of this work, expanding the number of crisis stabilization beds across the state, in addition to facilities where people can stay to receive onsite support while they work with a team to move towards their next step in resolving the crisis, and expanding and implementing peer respites for 18 and over individuals to receive onsite, intensive peer support. A technical and operation plan is currently under development and will be shared in the fall of 2022. This plan will create a system to ensure a crisis call center hub can coordinate and dispatch crisis services. The go live for these plans is July 2024 with the rollout of system and resources occurring in 2023. Presenters acknowledge the workforce shortage and that the CRIS committee is also working to address this as part of their planning.
