**Tony Walton,** SURSAC Chair and Adult Substance Use Section Manager, with Washington State Health Care Authority, provided SURSAC updates.

#### **Questions and Comments**

Q: Does anyone have a strong idea as to how things are going in Oregon? I have heard a lot of critique online on most fronts concerning legalization/decriminalization trends.

A: They were providing flexibility in how communities and different regions were using community-based grants. Although, oversight may have actually moved to the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission. They can find out and possibly have someone come share what is happening in Oregon around these topics.

#### **LEAD Education Series – Part 1**

Malika Lamont, Director of the Washington State Technical Support Team for the LEAD Support Bureau, Brandi McNeil, Deputy of Purpose. Dignity. #### Questions and Comments RE: LEAD Education Series – Part 1

Q: Is there anyone in Whatcom County, respective to LEAD, who I may connect with?

A: Yes, and their contact information will be provided.

Q: What are your thoughts on if LEAD were to be eliminated and what are your thoughts on if it were able to take the scale given the currents around drug supply and behavioral health issues? Especially where there are numerous budget cuts around the state.

A: One of the risks of this model being eliminated is that it is a pre-booking diversion program whose purpose is to not overwhelm criminal-legal systems and tax the system of more individuals being in carceral settings. Eliminating the model entirely would mean the criminal-legal system becomes more burdened and the issues of incarceration and behavioral health issues will continue to rise.

Q: For those law enforcement agencies wherein the model was not positively received, or in some cases retribution or threat, were those respective agencies where those officers worked contacted or dealt with in any way?

A: Yes. Nationally, it has happened, but it does not happen a lot. It comes back to that collective power-sharing and collaboration, and moving at the speed of trust that the LEAD Model operates under.
