#### **Substance Use Recovery Services Advisory Committee (SURSAC) Updates**

**Teesha Kirschbaum,** Director of the HCA Division of Behavioral Health & Recovery, shared updates regarding the budget process:

- Governor Ferguson released his budget proposal that includes budget reductions to many of the programs that are focused on behavioral health, including a potential 50% reduction in the Recovery Navigator Program, and long-term civil commitments.
  - There should be a final and active budget near the end of the 2025 Legislative Session toward the beginning of May.

- As a cabinet agency, HCA's role is to reflect the governor's priorities. We've submitted
  possible budget scenarios as directed, but the final decisions rest with the governor's office
  and the Legislature, and the final budget is still several months away.
- The budget process is still in its early stages, and final decisions are months away.
- On March 18, 2025, an updated revenue forecast will be release, which will provide guidance on how much of a budget deficit Washington State is facing.

#### **Questions and Comments from SURSAC Members**

## Q: Are there any updates related to the opiate and alcohol taxation funding report that Rep. Davis discussed at the February 2025 SURSAC meeting?

A: Rep Davis notes that any bill that increases state revenue is not subject to cut off and that revenue bills are usually discussed toward the end of session. Rep. Davis reported she will provide that bill number once it is introduced.

#### Q: When will we know how much the cuts are to the Recovery Navigator Program (RNP)?

A: The budget will not be released and known until close to the end of the Legislative Session. Last Day of Session, or sine die, is currently April 27<sup>th</sup>, 2025. Barring any need for a Special Session.

### Q: How will proposed budget cuts affect the SURSAC Committee and programs that the Committee has supported?

A: We are not able to provide a clear answer to this question until the final budget is released toward the end of Legislative Session.

Q: Were these programs framed in a way that displays the importance of public safety that the Governor's Office was able to see and understand? Because this is a loss in infrastructure in communities that are not typically put into budget cuts.

A: The budget reductions were very difficult for the HCA to decide on as they have to decide where general fund state (GFS) dollars are currently being allocated and where some potential reductions are that could be made.

#### **SURSAC Member Comment Period**

- Representative Lauren Davis shared that individuals can reach out to her office and they can work toward coordinating a letter to the Governor's Office and to the budget writers for both the House and Senate. They currently do have HB 1427, that directs to the HCA to look at contracting with an entity to come up with low barrier cost effective mechanisms to potentially offload some of the cost. There is a lot of rigor involved in properly billing Medicaid and part of the goal of this subcontract would be to figure this out. As a result, it would reduce burden on agencies providing services and free up more funding.
- A SURSAC member shared that a letter is being formed, and Caroline Sanders, from Purpose. Dignity. Action, will be sending this out to individuals. All RNP-related staff will eventually receive a sign-on letter for this so to be sure to look at their email.
- A SURSAC member suggested that the SURSAC Committee could potentially draft their own letter of support. The SURSAC Chair will follow up with HCA legislative affairs and provide an answer to this via email.
- A SURSAC member shared that our federal government may be cutting Medicaid. This is important to remember as the federal government is looking at \$880 billion worth of cost savings from Medicaid.
- A SURSAC member shared "Give our programs a few years .tax the rich. just sayin'."
- A SURSAC member shared that Homeless Outreach Stabilization Transition (HOST) is also funded with 100% general fund state dollars, so asked why HCA did not propose cuts for other, similar programs. They also shared that RNP is both a housing and a public safety program, both of which the Governor directed to be preserved.

#### **Public Comment**

Q: The Governor said that all programs that were added in the last two years would be cut as well. What BH programs do you think will fall into that category?

A: Each state agency went through budget reduction scenarios to review recently implemented programs and the full list of those was sent to the Office of Financial Management (OFM). The Governor's Office uses this information to put forward the proposed budget. Q: An attendee asked for clarification as whether HCA was part of the decision-making process to propose to cut RNP funding by half or if it originated with the Governor's office?

A: The original proposed budget reduction scenarios originated at the HCA level.

Q: What data was looked at in supporting the decision to make a fifty percent reduction in funding?

A: It was a very difficult decision in deciding which programs would be put forth as potential cuts and this is only one step in the process as they do not have a final budget. We had to look at where GFS dollars were and how proposed budget reductions can be done based on that.

Q: Who can individuals contact and provide information to relative to the return on investment of such programs like RNP so it can be framed differently? Who can we contact for next steps?

A: Contacting one's local state legislative representative or senator is how you could go about providing this information.

#### Q: Will other Blake programs such as HOST see budget cuts as well?

Questions and Comments from SURSAC Members RE: Recovery Navigator Program Q3 2024 Quarterly Reports

Q: How much direct care is SUD treatment, harm reduction....related? And direct care and referral services are duplicated (they can have more than 1)?

A: I can answer the first portion of that question, 100 percent of RNP King Co. Peer WA is harm reduction related.

Q: It feels disingenuous (or cognitive dissonance) occurring as the meeting started off sharing that there is an HCA-proposed budget cut of RNP by 50%, yet the data being shared shows a return on investment of the program and is in alignment with the Governor's priorities. Can there be more mindfulness towards that?

A: Tony Walton responded and thanked the member for their feedback and comments. He further noted that the Governor's Budget Reduction proposals were released two business days prior to the SURSAC meeting, which didn't leave ample time for additional planning. A decision was made to bring the information to the committee to support immediacy and transparency.

#### **COMMENTS:**

- A SURSAC Member shared an older example of how we documented care navigation activities which has been very helpful information for understanding more about what exactly occurred <a href="https://adai.uw.edu/care-navigation-2022">https://adai.uw.edu/care-navigation-2022</a>
- A SURSAC Member shared that they are shocked at the proposed fifty percent reduction proposed to RNP funding and it may have something to do with having health efforts and public health efforts confused with public safety efforts.
  - A SURSAC member shared they watched the Governor's Office press conference the
    week prior and there was not a clear definition on how public safety is defined so they
    may be some ambiguity around this definition that contributed as a factor in budget
    decisions.
- A SURSAC Member shared that they will discuss with University of Washington Government Relations team, but they are, too, in support of a letter and that framing it from the lens of how it supports public safety would be helpful language.

Questions and Comments from Meeting Attendees RE: Recovery Navigator Program Q3 2024 Quarterly Reports

Q: Could we have this presentation added to the chat for later review?

A: The presentation will be available on the SURSAC website here.

#### **COMMENTS:**

- A meeting attendee shared that the Governor "has a very narrow definition of "public safety" that he is using as he considers the budget."
- A meeting attendee shared that "66% of all individuals referred in our counties identified as homeless with/without housing, and 34% of all referrals are from our partners in public safety, from 22 law enforcement agencies and jails. In agreement with what Rep Davis already mentioned in the chat., in many ways, RNP is in alignment with the Governor's priorities."
- A meeting attendee shared that she has RNP participants who would be more than willing to share their stories in spaces beyond SURSAC meetings and they can reach out to her if this is something they would like. - A meeting attendee followed up with this and shared that they belief that support from law enforcement would also show the governor of the importance of RNP.

Questions and Comments from SURSAC Members RE: Research and Data Analysis Presentation on statewide arrest and charge data related to Simple Possession

Q: Will this information be shared for later review?

A: Yes.

Q: The percentages in the categories are the percent of the total sample of possession charges across the state? So, when you indicate for Pierce County, 11%, that means that of all the total charges filed, Pierce County comprises 11% of those charges. Is that correct?

A: Yes.

Q: Do we have access to demographic/racial breakout data?

A: It is currently on DSHS' radar to look at but was not something that we were able to incorporate into the tables shown today. It is at the top of the list for next steps.

Q: Can we also get it broken out according to location? It would be interesting to see some places that have local ordinances against harm reduction activities.

A: Yes.

#### **COMMENTS:**

A SURSAC Member shared it would be helpful to see a demographic break out.

<u>Questions and Comments from Meeting Attendees RE: Research and Data Analysis Presentation on statewide arrest and charge data related to Simple Possession</u>

Q: Are these filed charges or referred to charges?

A: Kevin Walker, from DSHS, confirmed they were charges filed.

Q: Is anything being done to see some historical data? Compared to prior years and felony charges prior to the Blake changes. It would be helpful to see if there is any variance. This type of data would be helpful for programs to get on a regular basis so we can shift our efforts to focus on agencies that are those "highest filers."

A: Some historical data had initially been looked at, but a much deeper look is something that can be done.

Q: Do these figures count charges under local ordinances?

A: Yes.

Q: Is there a way to have context with general population compared to these numbers? The numbers are great, but without knowing the size of these police departments and the populations they serve, it's really just a number with no context.

A: Adding some of these numbers would be helpful in interpreting these numbers and is something we can look into adding.

#### **COMMENTS:**

- A meeting attendee shared that from "March 29,2023 to February 28, 2025 the city of Kennewick referred 60% of possession of controlled substances cases to the RNP Pretrial Diversion program. RNP celebrated 8 Graduates from Pretrial Diversion last Friday."
- A meeting attendee shared that showing whether these percentages are files charged or referred to for charging because it would show whether or not these numbers do or do not include diverted cases.
